Your Council met on 3<sup>rd</sup> September and the draft minutes of the meeting will be on the website (Meetings page) by the time you receive your October magazine.

Our discussions included the delayed improvement to Broadband in Lower Enmore in particular (compared with the availability of full fibre to households near the school and church). Whilst this is not something the Council can solve directly, Councillor David Comley continues to lobby for improvement.

Although scheduled for the current year, we still don't have a definite date for the speed limit changes and road sign refurbishment. We will keep you informed as soon as we know more. When this work has been done, it is proposed that extra warning signs be added to make drivers more aware of horse riders and their safety. We would welcome input from horse riders about the most appropriate sites for such signs. We hope that the signs will also improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists.

Thank you to everyone who came to help at the Jubilee Meadow on 1<sup>st</sup> September. In particular, the long grass was cut and raked up ready for autumn and winter, after being left to give the grass and wild flowers a chance to self-seed. (Andrew advises cutting in late August/early September if you have a "wilded" area in your own garden.) Your help is much appreciated and makes the work involved fun, sociable and completed much more efficiently. Thank you.

### **Enmore Memorial Hall – News And Updates**

**Pop Up Café.** We held our first Pop-Up Café of the new season in September. Thank you to everyone who supported it. It was a little quieter than usual so we hope, as the days get shorter and cooler, that the smell of freshly cooked bacon will draw the crowds in again. The dates for the next two cafes are **Sat 12<sup>th</sup> Oct and Sat 9<sup>th</sup> Nov, both from 10 am to 12 pm.** 

**Solar Panels.** We have spent a lot of time trying to understand the problems with the set-up of the Solar Panels, sometimes in difficult four-way discussions with Solis, Rutland Renewables, Solar Sam and ourselves. We hope that the problem has been identified and lies with faulty meters, which are about to be replaced. Time will tell.

**Hall Amenities.** The roof above the ladies toilets has been fixed and the floor will be fixed in early October. The hall may be out of action for a few days. We would like to fully refurbish the toilets at the same time, if funds allow. And, on the subject of funds, we have applied for a grant from the Hinckley Point C Small Grants Fund for various upgrades to the hall. We won't know the outcome until early November but we are keeping our fingers firmly crossed.

#### **'Christmas night'** bringing a Ukrainian Christmas to you Friday 8<sup>th</sup> November, 7pm at Enmore Memorial Hall

The evening will start with a masterclass, learning to make some traditional Ukrainian dishes to try for yourself. To set the mood for a beautiful evening full of festive spirit and emotion, you are invited to purchase and devour delicious Ukrainian dishes – a real treat.

When the performance starts, you will see a Ukrainian family getting ready to celebrate Christmas – children decorating a tree, adults finishing the last preparations, laying the table, preparing the "didukh" and placing it in the most sacred place, under the icons. It's a happy, extended family enjoying the evening with lots of laughter and singing. Carol singers arrive to wish everyone Merry Christmas with more traditional songs and games.

The performance is combined with a video of the members of the family who could not join the festivities and have to make the best of a Christmas in the trenches, under heavy shelling.

Throughout the evening, you will cry and laugh, rejoice and, perhaps, mourn. Happiness because the saviour is born and tears because so many have lost their lives.

**"Christmas night"** captivates the audience from the very first moments and keeps giving throughout the performance. The show is bilingual, with songs and verses in Ukrainian and subtitles on the screen.

### **Local And Regional Weather Report**

Weather lore has a lot to say about October including "Rain in October, Wind in December", "Full Moon in October without frost, then no frost till full Moon in November." and "When berries are many in October, Beware a hard winter". Also "*If in the fall of the leaf in October many leaves wither on the boughs and hang there, it betokens a frosty winter and much snow" and "When birds and badgers are fat in October, expect a cold winter". Notable dates are St Denis (October 9<sup>th</sup>), and St Luke (18th October). "A hard winter follows a fine St.Denis.", but there is often fair weather around St Luke's, known as St.Luke's Little Summer". Also, "If the oak bears many acorns at St Luke's, this foretells a hard winter". Finally the famous rhyme "If ducks do slide at Hallowtide (31<sup>st</sup> October), At Christmas they will swim; If ducks do swim at Hallowtide, At Christmas they will slide".* 

August started very warm but cooled later in the month and it was very dry with lower than usual rainfall. Storm Lillian brought some rain and strong winds in the middle of the month.

Nearly 8 days out of 10 days saw some sun but 9 days out of 10 days saw partly cloudy weather or rainy days.

Rainfall: Local 25 mm, Regional 74.3 mm = 83% of normal Minimum temperatures: Local 10 deg, Regional 12.3 deg = +1.3 deg Maximum Temperatures: Local 29 deg, Regional 20 deg = +0.9 deg

What are the weather forecasts for October? BBC says starting warm and dry but probably continuing wetter and windier. Netweather says generally wet and unsettled but warm. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? Saint Lawrence (10th of August) was wet so not good autumn weather. The Jet Stream forecast at the start of October shows it across the south of the UK with low pressure and winds from the south west. This indicates unsettled and warm but probably wet weather.

### Message from The Revd Eleanor King

Dear All,

I was recently reminded of a fellow priest who told a story of how she has arrived early to take a service at a church she didn't really know. It was an old church, surrounded by fields and farms, it was small and full of character. As she waited for the Churchwarden to arrive to open up, she sat in the porch and reflected on how many prayers must have been said over the centuries in the church. She thought of the prayers of joy, of thanksgiving, of sadness, of praise and of challenge. She wondered: 'what if the stones in the walls could speak'?

We might often think of churches being places of worship where people join together to sing hymns and hear the Bible read – and yes, they are. But they are also places where we can visit on our own or as a group – to say a prayer or look around or sit in the presence of God. Often folk record in the visitors' book words such as 'peace', 'quiet' and 'beauty'. In our busy world perhaps this is what is needed, a place to be still and quiet, without the pressure of time. The churches in the Benefice are open during daylight hours and you are welcome to pop in at any time.

Having the churches open is only possible with the help of the teams of people who, quietly and often unobserved, unlock our churches each morning and lock them up again each evening – thank you to you all.

The restoration of the Willis (Grade II\*listed) monument will commence on 30<sup>th</sup> September and last for most of October. Please be aware that this may mean some restricted access to the churchyard.

**Wood and chippings** are still available and we would love to see them taken before the spring, so that the primrose patch can flourish once more!

### **CIDER AND CIDER HOUSES**

October sees the beginning of the apple harvest and also the beginning of the cider season. Goathurst, up until the 1960s, had a cider house, which was where cider was made and could be purchased and drunk. Looking at the house names, Little Orchard, Old Orchard, it seems likely there was a plentiful supply of apples. My own house, Calleva House was an orchard before any building took place. The cider produced in the cider house would not have been the refined product we would now expect from producers such as Rich's and Sheppy's, it would have been Scrumpy, which was made by fermenting the apples to a maximum alcohol level. This left it extremely dry with very little apple taste and a lot of general debris, hopefully mostly apple bits, as it was unfiltered. Up until 1887 it was legal to pay agricultural labourers in cider, although it does not seem likely to have been an effective aid to productivity. Mostly it was given as an incentive to work for the employer and up to 8 pints a day could be supplied during the harvest time.

The history of cider and apples is obviously closely linked. The first recorded reference to cider was in 55 BCE, when the Romans came across the Britons drinking a form of cider made from crab apples. The ancestors of modern varieties of apples probably originated in the forests of the mountainous regions of Kazakhstan and the Romans had acquired seeds and cultivars from their conquests in Syria and the Caucasus. Thus by 450 CE, the Romans had introduced new apple varieties to Britain and also the techniques of orchard management. The Romans had also developed a taste for cider. Whether cider was drunk by the Anglo Saxons is not recorded, but seems likely as a reference to apples was made to apples by King Alfred in his writings in 885 CE. It was the Normans who established cider throughout Britain as a cheap and popular drink, by planting orchards and introducing advanced pressing techniques. The word cider probably derives from Hebrew shekar or Greek sikera meaning 'strong drink', but the Norman word cidre has survived to todav.

### **Enmore Broadband Update**

September 2024

Eighteen months have passed since I took on the responsibility for bringing high speed broadband to Enmore . My initial research took me to Openreach's Fibre Community Partnership program and I contacted all properties in Enmore and asked each one to register an interest with Openreach. Sixty properties responded .

Openreach then placed this program on hold and at around the same time I became aware of a venture involving Somerset and Devon called Connecting Devon and Somerset . A company called Airband had been chosen with some financial support coming from government/council . A timeline of spring 2024 when work would begin and autumn 2024 for completion was given for Enmore . In November 2023 I requested a more detailed timeline and had to wait until April 2024 to be told that Airband was looking to refinance its business .

A few years ago the line from the Spaxton exchange to a cabinet opposite Enmore School was converted from copper to fibre which has meant that many houses in Upper Enmore enjoyed high speeds due to their proximity to this cabinet . These residences were excluded from the Airband plan , however , it would appear that Openreach have extended the fibre to include most properties in Upper Enmore . Recently a resident was invited to have fibre installed to his property free of charge .

Openreach are back ! In June they announced a £15 billion investment that would give high speed broadband to an additional 2.7million premises and mid August announced an £800million investment that would provide to 312,000 rural homes . Openreach have signed contracts with our government for West and North Devon and North Somerset and are in discussions over Mid and South Devon and South Somerset . It would seem that we drew the short straw !

I believe there is only one solution to this problem and that is to re-engage with Openreach. They have the exchange infrastructure, switching equipment, fibre networks, an experienced workforce and financial strength. How can Airband compete?

Apparently Airband was chosen through a tender process . They offered prices of £25/month for download speeds of 150 Mbits/sec and £55/month for 900 Mbits/sec . I pay £35/month for 8 Mbits/sec . The only other alternative is Starlink but at a cost of £100/month . The Airband price is too cheap which is probably why they were chosen by our council and probably why they are having to refinance their business .

I have asked CDS (connecting Devon and Somerset) to comment on my request to re-engage Openreach but I am still awaiting an answer after four months . I have also asked them whether their meetings with or without Airband are open to the public and if so when and where is the next meeting . This has gone unanswered . I have now asked to see the tender invitations , the tender offerings , the CDS decision with explanation and the contract with Airband. Nothing yet so I have now made a formal request using the "freedom of information " act . The requested information will be with me by September 25 th .

There is a law that states every household and every business must be able to download data at a minimum rate of 10Mbits/sec and upload at a minimum rate of 1 Mbit/sec, however, there are eligibility conditions. There cannot be any access to existing decent speeds (>10Mbits/sec download etc) and must not be covered by a public broadband scheme offered by government in the next twelve months i.e Airband.

Those in Upper Enmore may qualify but those in Lower Enmore cannot whilst the contract with Airband exists . There may be a connection charge and a maximum monthly charge of £56.20 is mentioned. If anyone believes they qualify then you will need to phone BT on 08007830223 and request an upgrade . Let me know of any progress . My objective is to try and convince CDS to cancel the contract with Airband and re-engage with Openreach.
